TO OUR CONTRIBUTORS.

The Executive Committee have pleasure in submitting to contributors and others interested this report, which briefly surveys the activities of the Citizens Welfare Service for the 12 months ended on 30th June, 1951, and includes audited Financial Statements.

The past year has been marked by an expansion of C.W.S. activities through the creation of a Citizens Advice Bureau, to which reference will be found elsewhere in this report. The Executive Committee hope that this Bureau will provide as useful a community service as have similar bureaux in England over the past twelve years.

Another feature of the experiences of the past year to which attention should be drawn, if only because of its serious threat to the maintenance of C.W.S. activities, is the increasing cost of material relief and the steadily rising cost of administration. A reference to this matter will also be found on another page.

May we take this opportunity of reminding you that, as a contributor, you, members of your Firm or members of your family, are entitled and cordially invited to use, in any appropriate way, the service which you help to maintain. Do you, for instance, ever hear of a family in trouble? Are you ever asked to help such a family? Do you ever require information on the operation of any statutory benefit? Or does it happen that you sometimes want to know something of the functions of any State or voluntary welfare organisation? In these and similar ways, your Service—the Citizens Welfare Service—can help you.

THE HIGH COST OF MATERIAL RELIEF — AND THE

The expansion and the liberalising of statutory benefits which has been a feature of Australian social history during the last quarter of a century, has had the result of greatly lightening the financial burden carried by those welfare agencies which undertake the responsibility of helping distressed families with such basic material needs as food, clothing, firing and rent.

But the material help given by an agency such as the Citizens Welfare Service is affected very little, if at all, by the provision of Governmental benefits. These do not cover, for instance, such things as surgical appliances, hearing aids, wheeled chairs or spectacles. An artificial limb which, only a few years ago, cost £ 27/10/-, now costs £ 58. Spectacles which were bought for a few shillings now cost pounds.

Prevailing conditions, also, involve the C.W.S. in expensive forms of assistance which, until quite recent years, rarely had to be given. For instance, because of the shortage of Benevolent Home beds, especially for infirm and bed-ridden people, it is often necessary to meet at least some part of the cost of private hospital accommodation.

The consequent strain on C.W.S. funds which are available for material aid is becoming very heavy indeed. Benevolent citizens are reminded that donations may, if desired, be earmarked for relief purposes only, or for any special form of relief, and will be administered strictly in accordance with the wishes or direction of donors.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It is with much regret that the Committee record the death, during the year, of Mr. J. F. Lush, who was an interested and active member for several years.

The Committee were sorry to lose the services of Mrs. Armstrong and Mr. T. Baillie, both of whom felt it necessary to resign because of pressure of other duties.

The Committee recently welcomed a new member in the person of Mrs. E. Lloyd, an Englishwoman who will be, for a time, a resident of Melbourne. Mrs. Lloyd has been particularly helpful in the organisation of the Citizens Advice Bureau, as she had had considerable experience of the work of a similar bureau in England.

INCREASING COST OF ADMINISTRATION AND SERVICE.

As in all other walks of life, everything that the C.W.S. does or uses is costing more. It is not only in the realm of material giving that this applies. The cost of the services of our skilled staff, of paper and printing, of postages and of all office equipment, mounts steadily and shows no sign of reaching stability. The one thing which does not rise appreciably is the income from which these increased costs must be met, although it is encouraging that a number of our contributors, realising the position, have increased the amounts of their subscriptions.

Every care is taken to eliminate extravagance in administration costs. All expenditure is carefully scrutinised by the Committee. The work of the agency is carried on by a staff which, without sacrifice of standards and efficiency, cannot be reduced. Despite this, administration expenditure for the year exceeded income by approximately £500. The Committee appeal earnestly to the community for the financial support which is necessary to arrest this dangerous drift.

CO-OPERATION ACKNOWLEDGED.

C.W.S. plans for the assistance of troubled families often include the financial co-operation of some other appropriate agency, such as the Queen's Fund, the Society to Assist Parsons of Education, the Carry-On Club, Melbourne Legacy, or a Ladies' Benevolent Society, or perhaps a charitable Trust such as The "Walter & Eliza Hall" Trust, or the Fred J. Cato Charitable Fund. To all these and other bodies which have helped during the year, a warm expression of appreciation is herein recorded.

IT MADE US HAPPY TOO !

The C.W.S. was able to give a helpful service to a New Australian, who wrote as follows:

"I received yesterday a very kind letter from you. My English language is not good enough to tell you as happy it made me. I am very grateful for all your help in my bad time full of difficulties."

A CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU FOR MELBOURNE

Inquiries that have come to the C.W.S. from time to time have inspired the belief that there is a need in Melbourne for a Citizens Advice Bureau on the lines of similar bureau which have been operating with much success in Great Britain over the past twelve years. Their general purpose is described in an official handbook as:—

“to make available for the individual accurate information and skilled advice on many of the personal problems that arise in daily life, to interpret legislation, to help the citizen to benefit from and wisely use the services provided for him by the State.”

It was decided, during the year, to make the experiment of establishing such a bureau at C.W.S. Headquarters, Morris House, and, with the aid of some press publicity, it was opened early in May. There has not yet been time to assess the success of the experiment. The fact that some eighty enquiries were received during the first two months does suggest that the bureau is filling a community need.

ADVISORY SERVICE FOR MIGRANTS.

With the authority and co-operation of the Commonwealth Department of Immigration, the Victorian Council of Social Services has organised a mobile advisory service at Migrant Camps around Melbourne. The C.W.S. is lending a hand in this interesting experiment by making available the services of members of its staff at the Coburg Camp.

C.W.S. HELPS HOSPITAL PATIENTS.

The development of Almoner Departments in the principal public hospitals has produced an increasing call for C.W.S. co-operation in the supply of medical and surgical needs which are not normally provided by the hospitals themselves. Nearly one-third of the cases dealt with last year were referred by hospital almoners, and a very large proportion of these involved the giving or financing of, for example, an expensive surgical appliance, a hearing aid, spectacles, or private nursing fees. Through its Invalid Aid Fund, the C.W.S. expended £ last year, and it can be stated conservatively that 80% of this expenditure was incurred in the assistance of hospital patients who were referred to the C.W.S. by almoner departments.

CARE OF THE AGED.

The care of infirm, lonely and partially dependent aged people is a subject that has been attracting much attention, not only in welfare circles, but throughout the community generally. One of the most difficult tasks which may face the case-worker to-day is the institutional placement of aged people who are bedridden or who, for other reasons, cannot properly care for themselves. But institutional placement is only one factor in the matter of the care of the aged. Prevailing conditions are weighing heavily on these people in many ways. There is room for much community service in such directions as the provision of (a) recreational and other club facilities, (b) hot mid-day meals and other desirable amenities, and (c) winter firing.

The C.W.S. has been closely associated with two movements which have been initiated within this field and by the Rotary Club and the National Council of Women respectively. A Citizens' Committee, organized by the Rotary Club, is planning, with the aid of a substantial grant from the Sidney Myer Charitable Trust, a comprehensive research into every phase of the problem throughout the State. The National Council of Women has organised a Victorian Old People's Welfare Committee, which will consider immediately practicable steps with a view to improving the conditions of infirm and aged people in all possible ways.

FAMILY DESERTION.

In 66 cases dealt with during the year the direct cause of family need appeared to be the desertion of the breadwinner. It is unfortunate, to say the least, that deserting husbands can so easily evade their responsibilities and leave their wives and children to become dependent on State and Commonwealth aid. Social workers are agreed that the prevalence of family desertion presents a serious social and economic problem, and suggests a tightening, or more effective enforcement, of the law.

CASE WORK CONFERENCES.

The C.W.S. has continued to organise monthly case work conferences, as it has done now for many years. Eight of these useful gatherings were held during 1950 and were attended by representatives of 24 Statutory and voluntary agencies. There was an average attendance of 15 social workers at each conference.

WHAT "A CASE" MAY MEAN.

Some contributors are disposed to divide the cost of carrying on the agency by the number of cases dealt with, and the resultant dividend may inspire a critical comment on the high average cost per case. This reaction of the business mind is understandable, but it overlooks the fact that what we call a "case"—in other words, a family in distress—may be under our notice and the subject of our active interest over a period of months, during which time there may be many visits to the home, and perhaps several office interviews and other activities, which all mean time and money, but which may all contribute to the restoration of the family to a plane of self dependence.

THE VOLUNTARY AGENCY HAS ITS PLACE.

As evidence of the fact that many troubled citizens come under the notice of C.W.S. because of some need which is not covered by any Statutory Benefit, the following figures are submitted. They relate to the work of the past year.

This, of course, does not mean 585 separate cases as, in many instances, more than one of the above statutory benefits was

being received by the one person. The point to be emphasised is that all of the people included in the above figures found themselves in need of assistance or advice in some trouble or difficulty which lay outside the sphere of any statutory benefit.

APPRECIATIVE CLIENTS.

A family welfare agency does not help with thoughts of thanks, but it is only human to find a little encouragement in an expression of appreciation. Here are just a few excerpts from our 1950-51 letter-bag:

"My mother and I wish to express our gratitude for your very kind assistance. Be assured that your grand gesture will bring us both much comfort and happiness."

"I acknowledge the very generous gift of £16, which enabled me to complete the purchase of my hearing aid. I thank you all very sincerely for the very kindly help given to me."

"I am writing on behalf of Mr. —, who wishes to thank you very much for helping him to get his spectacles and a truss. He also wishes to thank the lady who called on him."

WIDE RANGE OF MATERIAL AID.

The material help given by the C.W.S. during the year from funds under its own control supplemented, in some instances, by grants from other agencies, covered such forms of help as—

In no instance was assistance given if the help required fell within the province of, and was available from, any other agency.

THE GIFT OF SKILLED SERVICE.

In a folder issued a few years ago the C.W.S. referred to its ambition to provide a skilled service to citizens "in any way socially unadjusted to their environments." Many people find themselves entangled in difficulties from which they cannot extricate themselves, but which do not necessarily call for material aid. Cases of this type may involve much time and thought, but the solution of the difficulty, whatever it may be, always brings with it a special sense of satisfaction. Here are just two examples drawn from the experiences of the past year—

1. *A C.W.S. social worker had occasion to visit Mrs. A., a deserted wife with three children, all of whom were living in two rooms and a vestibule, for which, together with the use of a kitchen, they were paying the quite unreasonable rent of £2 weekly. The place was old and dilapidated, and one of the rooms occupied by the family was in a bad state of disrepair. Mrs. A. hesitated to approach the Fair Rent's Board, as she feared that she might be evicted by her landlord. The C.W.S. approached the Board on her behalf, with the result that the rent was reduced from 40/- to 25/- weekly.*

2. *Mrs. S., an elderly, widowed Age Pensioner, and her invalid son were threatened with eviction from the little home in which they had lived for many years. The C.W.S. arranged for legal representation in the Court and secured a six months' stay of proceedings. During that period, a C.W.S. social worker was in frequent touch with Mrs. S., and made efforts in several directions to secure alternative accommodation for her. At the time of writing, arrangements have been concluded for her transfer to a home in an Emergency Housing Area. C.W.S. friendship and interest have saved this frail old lady from the worst effects of an extremely harassing experience.*
