Secretary: S. GREIG SMITH, F.C.I.S., J.P. The efforts of the Citizens Welfare Service are concentrated primarily on the preservation of family unity, the stabilising of unstable families, the giving of the supportive aid which many families need at points of threatened breakdown.

"The family is the all-important key to human happiness, to stability of personality, to responsibility, to good citizenship." This affirmation of the Community Service Society of New York in its last Annual Report is one which the Citizens Welfare Service most warmly endorses.

This report briefly summarises the story of Citizens Welfare Service activities during the past year in the family guidance field.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

FIRST OBJECTIVE

The first of the Objects set out in the Constitution and Rules of the Citizens Welfare Service is:

"The maintenance of an efficient family welfare agency to give advice, help or personal service to individuals or families, where required."

- (1) To attain this objective, the Citizens Welfare Service must be adequately equipped to give any necessary service to families threatened with a break-down or disruption because of illness, injury, unemployment, mental disturbance, children's problems or other cause.
- (2) Adequately staffed with experienced social workers, and able to draw on other expert services as required in the course of its work with, and treatment of, a disabled family.

STRENGTHENED SERVICE

Definite action has been taken during the year to ensure that the Citizens Welfare Service is adequately equipped for the place which it aims to fill in the welfare work of the community, and the Committee are pleased to report that:

- 1. The casework staff has been greatly strengthened by the appointment of Mr. Leonard Tierney, B.A., M.S., who has been given the status of Director of Social Work and Research, and who returned recently after a four years' period of study and practical work in America and England. Under his guidance, a high standard of casework service is being offered to families and individual citizens.
- 2. Additional qualified social workers will be added to the staff as soon as possible.
- 3. Arrangements have been made for the services of a qualified dietitian and home economist to be available as required in the treatment of certain family problems.
- 4. The typing and stenographic staff has been strengthened by the appointment of Miss J. Powne.

FINANCE

Reference to the financial statements included in this Report will show that the Committee have again had to draw on capital resources in order to meet expenses for the year. The Committee much regretted the necessity for taking this step, but they considered that it had to be taken in order to meet the demands which the agency had to face for skilled service and for material aid for many hundreds of clients.

The Committee most earnestly emphasise the need for increased income to enable the Citizens Welfare Service to carry on a helpful service to troubled citizens, which is not elsewhere available. There is, unfortunately, a limited emotional appeal in the work that the agency is doing. It is not easy to "sell" the idea of the community value of a well-equipped family guidance service.

Increased public support is urgently necessary, not only for the maintenance of C.W.S. family guidance service, but for the giving of material relief. Financial help, constructively given, may be an important part of a plan of treatment of a disturbed or disorganised family, and is not always available from statutory sources. That is why the C.W.S. must maintain its own Relief Funds, and must look to the public to support these so that, at all times, help may be given promptly and adequately.

Progress with expansion in welfare work depends on the goodwill of the public generally, and the development of a well-informed public opinion. This involves interpretation to citizens regarding functions and services. The Committee plan to extend as widely as possible during the coming year, a knowledge of the purpose and the activities of the agency. It also involves the participation in the work of the agency of representative citizens who are leaders in religion, business, industry, labour and other community activities. Steps have already been taken to broaden the basis of Committee membership, but much more remains to be done in this direction.

INTERNATIONAL SOCIAL SERVICE

This organisation was established in 1921. One of its objects is to deal with human problems and difficulties which involve action in more than one country. The need of such an organisation has become intensified as a result of migration movements since the last war. A few months ago, an Australian Branch of I.S.S. was formed, with headquarters in Sydney, and there has already been considerable co-operation between it and the C.W.S. which has been fulfilling the function of an I.S.S. agent or correspondent in Victoria.

CO-OPERATION WITH STATUTORY AGENCIES

The passage of time has led to a re-thinking of the different roles to be played by the voluntary agency and the statutory services. Increasingly, it is becoming recognised that the two types of service are not rivals or alternatives, but are necessary complements of each other. The C.W.S. is happy to record the helpful co-operation it has received from Government Departments.

THE ELDERLY CITIZEN

The Citizens Welfare Service welcomes the addition of the Victorian Old Peoples Welfare Council to the list of agencies which concern themselves with this branch of welfare work. The establishment of Homes, Clubs and other amenities for lonely and frail old people is much to be commended.

Many old folk, however, have their own individual problems which are best handled by a casework agency and the Citizens Welfare Service is prepared to make its own contribution to this field of service. Much of the material aid, also, which the C.W.S. has to provide—as, for instance, in payments for such things as spectacles and surgical needs—goes to Age Pensioners.

HEARING AIDS FOR THE DEAF

Another illustration of C.W.S. service to elderly people is to be found in the continuance of the activity which was initiated over two years ago, and which is designed to bring hearing aids into the possession of deaf citizens who are not in a position to purchase them. This service has been rendered possible only through—

- 1. The generosity of the donors of second-hand hearing aids.
- The co-operation of hearing aid firms which have reconditioned gifted aids and staffed a fortnightly clinic for the testing of applicants.
- 3. The sustained donation by the Eveready Company of battery supplies for the initial installation of aids.

The Committee have pleasure in recording that, up to date, 180 deaf citizens—mostly Age Pensioners—have been fitted with efficient hearing aids. There is still a waiting list of applicants to be overtaken, and the C.W.S. appeals for further donations of unwanted hearing aids which may be efficiently reconditioned.

MATERIAL HELP AND SERVICE

Mrs. S. lives some 80 miles from Melbourne. She has to bring a three years old son periodically to a Melbourne hospital for treatment. It costs £2 for a bus fare every time she comes to the city and she has to remain there overnight. Her husband is a basic wage worker and the family have been facing heavy expenses through the illness of the child. Where can Mrs. S. find some financial aid?

Harry is 64 years of age and he and his wife are Age Pensioners. Harry has had a leg amputated and has been advised to get a peg-leg, which will cost £20. He has managed to save up £10. Where can he look for the balance?

Jack is a middle aged married man, living in a small country town. He and his wife and child are dependent on his Invalid Pension and other small statutory benefits. Jack's doctor has told him that he must wear a surgical appliance which he cannot afford to pay. Where can he seek the help that he needs? Ted is a 71 years old widower, living alone on an Age Pension. It became vitally necessary for Ted to be taken somewhere for a week or two for nursing care, but he was not deemed to be a suitable case for a public hospital. The only place available was a private nursing home. Where could Ted look for the financial help necessary to keep him there?

Fred and his wife are an elderly couple dependent entirely on Statutory benefits. Because of their failing eyesight, the Eye and Ear Hospital has prescribed bi-focal spectacles which will cost over £7 in all. Where can Fred and his wife turn for help to meet this expense which they cannot meet themselves?

Joseph is 80 years of age and lived with his wife and a son in a N.S.W. town where a business venture on which they embarked, failed. Despite his age, Joseph came over to Melbourne to seek work to help restore the family situation. It was an illadvised plan which failed when Joseph's health broke down. His wife and son could not help him apart from giving him a shelter with them. Where, in his stranded condition, could he turn for help to get back to them?

The answer to all these questions is — the Citizens' Welfare Service. The people above described are but a few of the hundreds who came or were referred to the C.W.S. last year because of some urgent need which could not be met elsewhere.

SERVICE

Apart from the giving of material things, the C.W.S. helps many families and individuals with sound guidance and personal service in a countless variety of problems and difficulties which threaten their ability to function normally and successfully in the community.

"You certainly do spread the sunshine in life," wrote a client to one of our social workers. She is a middle-aged woman, with whom we have maintained a friendly contact for eight years. She is very badly crippled as a result of rheumatoid arthritis, and practically never left her bed until the C.W.S. was instrumental in obtaining for her an electrically propelled wheeled chair. She is a widow with one daughter — an Invalid Pensioner. From time to time, we have been able to help her in material ways, but it has been the friendly visits of our social worker and the helpful advice given from time to time in family and other personal problems that inspired the "sunshine spreading" testimony.

MORRIS HOUSE

As in other years, the Committee have been happy to make the C.W.S. Board Room available for meetings of other bodies such as the Victorian Council of Social Service, the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria, the Victorian Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and the Victorian Old People's Welfare Council. The latter body, also, was provided with office space for its Director and his assistant for a period of several weeks while awaiting access to an office of its own.

CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

The C.W.S. has continued to maintain this service. Although not extensively used, it has proved to be of value to a number of enquirers on a variety of subjects.

OFFICE-BEARERS AND EVECUTIVE COMMITTEE

At the writing of this Report, Mr. Douglas Keep, C.W.S. President, is absent on an overseas trip, but the Committee are looking forward to his return later in the year. In his absence, Mr. W. M. Stewart, Vice-President and Honorary Treasurer, has undertaken the position of Acting President.

The Committee have been much strengthened by the recent addition to their numbers of three members in the persons of Mrs. Neilma Gantner, Mr. Howard Norman and Mr. G. C. Tootell.

STAFF

Mr. J. A. Lowell, Assistant Secretary of the agency for some years, resigned a few months ago to assume the position of Director of the R.S.L. Family Welfare Bureau. The Committee placed on record in their minutes their application of the capable way in which Mr. Lowell had carried out his duties.

Miss H. B. Smith, one of the agency's social workers, resigned during the year and the Committee wish to pay a tribute in this Report to her loyal and efficient service over a period of nearly 30 years. Her work was characterised by thoroughness combined with sympathy and understanding in her approach to the problems of those thousands of troubled citizens who passed through her hands.

The appointment of Mr. Leonard Tierney and Miss J. Powne has already been referred to.
